Bishop Royster has served in Pastoral ministry for the past 19 years in a variety of positions and denominations. He has served in the United Methodist Church, The Mennonite Church and the Baptist Church Traditions. Now along with other faithful Christians, Bishop Royster and family founded Living Water United Church of Christ.

Committed to the four biblical principles of Redemption, Restoration, Renewal and Refreshment...Living Water is not just your average church on the block nor is Bishop Royster your average Pastor. Working diligently to meet people where they are, Bishop Royster instills in the congregation a need to be like Christ. Slow to judge always ready to offer grace and mercy.

Bishop Royster is an advocate for preparing congregations for the ministry of availability. He is fond of saying that, "Ministry should not be limited to Sunday mornings. Sunday is a time of worship. Ministry should be done Monday thru Sunday on the bus stops, at the supermarkets, in workplaces, at soccer games, etc... Wherever people are... so is God and He is able to do miraculous things through His children that are prepared. In this current generation many will never grace the doors of a church...but like Jesus we must take the message to the people and tell them the good news. Like the woman at the well they can be FREE."

Bishop Royster has served as a staff minister, Associate Pastor, Church Planter and Pastor. In addition to his pastoral responsibilities Bishop Royster is the General Secretary of Higher Ground Christian Fellowship International and serves on the College of Bishops.

The Bishop is a graduate of Geneva College's Center for Urban Theological Studies with a BS in Urban Ministry Management. In addition, Bishop Royster has studied at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary and is a graduate of the Lutheran Theological Seminary In Philadelphia with a Master of Arts in Religion Degree with a specialization in the African American Church.

Bishop Dwayne D. Royster is married to the lovely Suzette Royster and together they are the parents of two beautiful daughters. The Roysters reside in the Greater Philadelphia Area.



Fighting for the Powerless: Supporting Refugee Resettlement in Vermont with Amila Merzdanovic and Rev. Lise Sparrow

Amongst all of the tempest tossed humanity, refugees are perhaps the most without power, having been stripped of roots and livelihood but, most importantly, of choice.

Churches are uniquely positioned to support refugees and their families by providing both personal connections and basic needs. Emina Merzdanovic, herself a Bosnian refugee from the wars in the former Yugoslavia, will offer her own story of resettling in Vermont and her experience helping to settle refugees from 28 different cultures here in Vermont as the current director of the Vermont Refugee Resettlement Program. Rev. Lise Sparrow will facilitate the discussion to follow Ms. Merzdanovic's presentation. With the anticipated arrival of Syrian refugees in Vermont in the next few years, this is an opportunity to learn how churches can be a part of the support network welcoming them to Vermont.

Worship Choir Rehearsal with Peter & Mary Alice Amidon

Peter & Mary Alice will teach two or three anthems to participants who wish to offer their choral gifts in the final worship of the 2016 Vermont Conference Annual Meeting.

Building Vermont's Moral Economy with Rev. Debbie Ingram

Even in progressive Vermont, our economic indicators are all heading in the wrong direction: real wages are down, the number of Vermonters on food stamps and the number of homeless are up, and the percentage of single mothers with children under the age of 5 is close to 50%. If we think these trends are morally unacceptable, what can we do to reverse them? This workshop will offer some concrete ideas and join participants together with other people of faith.

Youth Group Mission Trips—a week of sweat, laughter and faith with Rev. Lucia Jackson

Do you want a youth group activity beyond bowling and sardines? Do you want youth to experience faith in a dynamic, exciting way? Do you want to engage the youth of your church and your town? Then plan a youth mission trip! How? Who? Where? What? Why? Come to this workshop to learn about youth mission trips! You can do it!

God's Good Work in Guatemala and Around the World with Gloria Vicente and Rev. Kim McKerley

Gloria Vicente, a young UCC missionary of Mayan descent, will share about her seven years of work in Guatemala with women, organizations for communication among groups in conflict, the Healthy Stove Project and more. Rev. Kim McKerley, Pastor of Bethany UCC in Randolph and a long-time member of the national Common Global Ministries Board (UCC and Disciples) will share about the global context of Gloria's work.

Worshipping Well: A WorshipWell Beta Test with Rev. Jared Hamilton

Crafting worship that matters in our local settings can be challenging. This workshop aims to share stories of worship triumphs and worship flops, identify best practices and introduce a resource put together by local UCC pastors and lay people called *WorshipWell*. We hope this time will be of special interest for clergy and those that serve on local church worship teams.

- 2 Submitted by College Street Congregational Church
- 3 **WHEREAS**, all the major indicators of poverty in Vermont are trending in the wrong direction;
- 4 that is, the number of Vermonters on food stamps is going up, the rate of homeless Vermonters
- 5 is increasing, the percentage of families, especially single mothers with young children, who live
- 6 below the federal poverty line is increasing;
- 7 WHEREAS, the Vermont economy overall is actually growing, yet real wages are down and real
- 8 median household income is declining;
- 9 **WHEREAS**, our Scriptural prophetic tradition decries community choices that result in economic
- impoverishment in times of increasing abundance;
- WHEREAS, the Scriptures and teachings of all major faith traditions speak on behalf of those
- suffering from economic injustice, in which some have more than they need and others do not
- 13 have enough to live on;
- 14 **WHEREAS,** people of faith from many traditions can agree that we are called to bring about a
- moral economy, which can be defined as one that honors the dignity of all people in these ways:
- By providing full opportunity for all to express their gifts and abilities through work and
- 17 play.
- By ensuring that all work is justly valued.
- By ensuring that all who are unable to work because of societal or personal limitations
- are respected.
- By ensuring that the most vulnerable among us are respected.

- By acting as good stewards of the earth and its resources, and preserving life for
 future generations.
- THEREFORE LET IT BE RESOLVED that the Vermont Conference of the United Church of
 Christ
 - Call on each of the local churches to educate ourselves about issues that affect our development of a moral economy
 - Engage in the issues to which we are called by listening to congregation members, individuals who utilize our congregations' charitable services, and members of the community to understand ways in which the current economy excludes them
 - Work both within our churches and with other communities of faith to explore and act on ways of honoring the economic dignity of those in our local community
 - 4. Effect change on issues state-wide by supporting the community organizing efforts of Vermont Interfaith Action and other organizations working toward economic justice around specific legislation and budget priorities that will lead to a moral economy


